
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THE NEW SPIN ON BRIDAL FASHION

IT WAS A DULL, damp evening in London. Paola Meloni and Knut Akerhielm sat at home chatting about the day's events over dinner. Mid-meal, Knut laid down his knife and fork, got on one knee and proposed.

'I was so shocked,' says Paola, 'we'd been living together for a while but I'd never thought about marriage.' Knut, on the other hand, had been thinking about it for some time. 'I knew I wanted to marry Paola a few weeks after meeting her. I'd planned to make the proposal a grand gesture, but it just seemed the right time as we sat over dinner in the comfort of our own home,' he explained.

Paola and Knut had met two years earlier at a tennis-themed fancy-dress party. Knut spotted Paola through the crowd and knew he had to meet her.

'I first saw her from the back, dressed all in white with her incredible black hair, she really stood out from the crowd.' A few days later they met for a pizza and the rest, as they say, is history.

As Paola, a lawyer, and Knut, a banker, come from Italy and Sweden respectively, gathering friends and family together for the big event was going to take some planning.

Guests would be travelling from far and wide, so the couple decided to pick a location where everyone could come together for an entire weekend to relax and enjoy themselves. The luxury resort of Portofino in north west Italy seemed like a perfect choice — Paola could marry in her native country, and the place would make an ideal location for their guests.

After seeing the Abbey of La Cervara on the edge of town with its fabulous gardens and incredible views of the sea, the couple fell in love with the location. 'We'd visited a few places, but after seeing La Cervara we felt anything else would be second-rate,' says Knut.





La Cervara dates back to 1361, when the first stone was laid for a new monastery to be dedicated to San Girolamo. Its designers and first residents were Benedictine monks, for whom the monastery was a place of meditation and introspection. Travelling up the road to the Abbey, the tall, ancient Mediterranean woods envelop the monastery and, with the rugged coastline beyond, it is easy to understand their attraction to this stunning locations.



for those who want a peaceful but breathtaking location and, although sometimes a long and stressful process, Paola admitted she found arranging the wedding relatively stress free. 'All we had to do was decide what we wanted and the people at La Cervara organised it.'

Although the wedding plans weren't a source of concern, Knut did begin to grow worried about Paola's choice of wedding dress when she started making comments like: 'What's wrong with getting married in red? It's a nice colour,' and even hinting that the wedding dress may be more of a wedding bikini than a glamorous gown.

As Paola's sister, Antonella Meloni, was designing the dress, it was easy for them both to plant the seed of doubt in Knut's mind. However, Paola opted for an elegant full-length ivory gown with lace insert on the skirt and an organza coat. Antonella also designed her own dress for her role as bridesmaid – a beautiful yet contemporary mauve gown with embroidered ribbon detailing.

Most guests arrived on the Friday evening before the ceremony. They were welcomed by the couple and then whisked off to the neighbouring village of Paraggi to catch up and enjoy drinks by the sea. In keeping with the laid-back feel of the weekend, the ceremony was to take place in the early evening of the following day and the reception was going to be a relaxed dinner party.

On Saturday, the day of the ceremony, both bride and groom had rooms in the Abbey where they could get ready.

In what might be many a bride's nightmare, the couple met while making their way to their rooms. Instead of fleeing from the sight of each other, they tried to stop for a chat. However, the best man Peter, Knut's brother, was determined to heed age-old tradition and promptly ushered them off in different directions.

This was not the last time the couple would meet before the ceremony, however. As Paola has lost both her parents in recent years, she and Knut decided that they would meet outside the chapel and walk down the aisle together. This is one of both Paola and Knut's favourite memories of the day.

'I think Knut was relieved that I was dressed in white and fully covered up,' says Paola. 'She looked so glamorous and beautiful coming down the stairs. It was very intimate, just us on our own before we entered the chapel. Well, except for the photographer!' says Knut.

The ceremony was in both Italian and English, and ran without a hitch. On leaving the chapel, the guests gathered






to throw rice over the couple. 'That was really intense,' says Knut, 'it was amazing to come out and be surrounded by all our friends and family.'

The reception was a glamorous affair. 'In Sweden guests tend to come in eveningwear for weddings,' explained Paola, so when it came to the dinner party reception everyone was aptly dressed.

In keeping with another Swedish wedding tradition, speeches were numerous and included the bridesmaids,



best man, four witnesses, and Knut's mother and father.

The cutting of the cake was another high point for the couple. Guests gathered on the balcony surrounding a garden courtyard and the cake was set up in the middle. What was once a vegetable garden for the monks in the monastery is now the only Italian-style monumental garden in the Liguria region, extending over two levels that are connected by arbours and steps. On the lower level, cone-shaped hedges surround a 17th-century marble fountain.

'When the cake was cut, everyone was upstairs looking down at us,' says Paola, 'it felt like Hollywood with all the camera flashes.'

The evening was spent outside in the garden, where an impressive bar, which was under-lit bright blue, provided the drinks. After a night of dancing and drinking, Paola and Knut had arranged for a day of rest and relaxation for their guests. The next day they hired a boat to accommodate everyone and spent the entire day moored off the coast of Portofino, where they swam in the sea, ate lunch and drank the champagne left over from the wedding.

While Paola had spent the time running up to the wedding trying to convince Knut her wedding attire would be less than traditional, Knut was also playing his own game. 'He told me we were going fishing in Finland for our honeymoon,' laughs Paola, 'I didn't completely believe him, but I did start to worry.'

After the weekend in Portofino, the couple flew to their flat in the South of France to drop off their presents and more champagne. Knut still hadn't told Paola his real honeymoon plans, 'I'd arranged for us to fly to Copenhagen with Scandinavia Airlines for a night before setting off on our actual honeymoon. I think this was when she started to panic.'

In fact, Knut had booked a trip that would take them to South Africa on safari, followed by a road trip from Johannesburg to Cape Town, and was finally topped off with eight days relaxing in the Seychelles.

'We don't get to go on holiday often due to work, so this was a great break,' says Knut.

HOW IT WAS DONE

VENUE As well as offering a stunning venue, La Cervara can also organise everything for ceremonies and receptions, from food to photography, music to seating plans. The abbey dates back to 1361 when it was designed and built by Benedictine monks. The buildings house an impressive church, dining room, gallery area and a 16th-century cloister. There are numerous gorden areas offering views over the sea and coastline including the Wisteria court, Gardenia Garden, the Monumental Garden and the stunning Portofino Terrace that juts out over the Mediterranean sea below. It is located 36km from Genoa Airport.

FLOWERS Paola used red tulips for her bouquet. As these were out of season a supplier had to be tracked down by the florist. It is best to contact your florist well in advance of your wedding to discuss what flowers will be in season, this ensures you will not be disappointed at the last minute with what will be available.
